

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Cirque Du Soleil welcomes CSHC into the kitchen

On October 16, 2019, the Grade 11 culinary arts class from Collège Sturgeon Heights Collegiate (CSHC) had the opportunity to prepare food, with hands-on guidance, inside the kitchen of the touring Cirque Du Soleil show, Amaluna. The class received a tour of the kitchen led by cook Jamie Francis, who joined the organization seven years ago from England.

"It is kind of cool to learn that all of the chefs here (with Amaluna) are from different countries around the world," said Dylan T., CSHC Student.

The 15 students divided into two groups. Each group took turns preparing food in the kitchen and taking a tour backstage to explore the dressing rooms, the stage, the trap doors, training equipment and props. When in the kitchen,

students prepared dinner for the cast and crew to enjoy later that evening. Each day, the Amaluna kitchen provides meals for approximately 120 artists and staff in connection with the show.

"This is different than at school," said student Anais B, CSHC Student.



"It is more professional, there is more pressure, and you want to do better."

Students diced vegetables, mashed potatoes, kneaded pork, sliced prime rib, rolled out dough, and filled and shaped perogies tasks which many had never done before. Students also received a delivery shipment and unloaded groceries in bulk into the fridges and coolers. As the day approached 1 p.m., the class had prepared hundreds of perogies as well as

beef stroganoff for the Amaluna performers and crew to enjoy. This task wasn't new for the students as they prepare and serve food each day at their school cafeteria, which serves approximately 1,400 students.

"It involves a lot of teamwork," said Hannah M, CSHC Student.

While the work was similar to their culinary arts class, the experience opened their eyes to a new opportunity.

"I think it's cool because they get to travel," said Anais B. "They pack up and reassemble wherever they go next and do it all over again."

"The cook trade offers a wide variety of travel and learning journeys for everyone," said Mr. Joachim, Culinary arts teacher, CSHC. "There is so much to learn and see if we only can step a few inches out of our comfort zone!"

As a special thank you to the students for all their hard work, the Amaluna show organizer gifted the entire class with tickets to see the production. They also snuck the group in to witness an afternoon training session and learn more about Cirque Du Soleil.



Community spirit builds a Santa Shop at George Waters Middle School

Each year George Waters Middle School creates a second-hand gift store called the Santa Shop. This momentary holiday marketplace provides students with the opportunity to purchase and wrap presents from their immediate family. All gifts are donated to the school by staff members, friends and family of staff members and the community, and presents range in price from \$0.25 to \$1.

"I like that I can buy presents for my dad," said Michael S. "It's just me and my dad, so I can surprise him with Christmas presents, and he won't know what's in them."

Bruce Middle School, as it is known today, had an interesting start to its life as an educational institution. Tucked in behind the Grace Hospital on Treaty One Land, Bruce Junior High was set to open its doors to children from ages 11 to 14 in the fall of 1968. Due to a number of delays in construction, students actually attended schools in the neighbourhood, and then attended school in shifts, until Bruce was ready to officially open its doors as an open-concept school in 1969.

If you joined us for our 50th celebration on Friday, October 4, 2019, you would have been privy to a number of these warm candid memories shared by the first Vice Principal, who helped to design the school and from former and



current staff and students. You may have revelled in memories of winter camp, shared some belly laughs over hair styles and outfits from decades gone by, caught up with students who dated in grade eight and have been married ever since, recognized the set of the Hallmark Movie that our school was used for, or been reminded of the reason our interior classrooms have no windows! One of the most shocking moments came when we learned that the Grace Hospital's emergency plan listed our school as the triage site for a morgue!

The evening was an incredible success thanks to the hard work of our committee members including former teacher Wendy Sutton, former Principal Mr. W. (Bill) Cann, current teachers, Mr. P. Harland and Mr. J. Weber, current Principal, Mrs. Moffatt, and Vice Principal, Ms. O'Brien as well as all of our current team members and students who worked tirelessly to create welcoming spaces for our visitors to reminisce. A special thank you to our SJASD Trustees who brought greetings and shared stories and history about our community. Whether you consider yourself a Baron or a Bearcat, we were honoured that you took the time to join us for our 50th celebration!

Casting a Ballot at Every Age: The Federal Election in SJASD schools

The Federal Election for students 18 years and younger saw quite a turnout in St. James-Assiniboia School Division (SJASD) this year. Twelve SJASD schools hosted student elections using the Student Vote Canada program and campaign tools. Many students had the opportunity to feel connected to the federal election process and the results.

While the student election looked different at every school, all schools did their research and recognized the vital role democracy plays in Canada. In SJASD, three Senior Years schools, two Middle Years schools and seven Early Years schools carried out the student vote on campus.

According to Student Vote Canada, Student Vote is an authentic learning program. It provides students with the opportunity to experience the voting process firsthand and practice the habits of active and informed citizenship.

Some schools set up the election complete with security, greeters and representatives from each party to replicate the exact process. Others

connected the student vote to elections at their school, such as electing student council or student leadership teams. At multiple schools, teachers shared how the topic of climate change was of great

importance to their students and impacted their decision-making.

More than 1.1 million elementary and secondary schools across the country took part in Student Vote Canada 2019. The student election resulted in the:

- Liberal Party gaining 109 seats to form a minority government
- New Democratic Party forming the opposition with 98 seats
- Conservative Party winning 94 seats
- Green Party getting 28 seats
- Bloc Quebecois obtaining nine seats

Students take to the ballot box with passion for politics

This fall, several Grade six classrooms at École Ness took advantage of election season to drive our study of the Canadian government and the electoral system. The provincial election in September served as a starting point for discussions and planted the first seeds of curiosity about politics and civic issues. Our learning culminated in a mock election through Student Vote, a program that allows students across Canada to participate in National Student Vote Week.



In anticipation of the election, students researched the platforms of each of the major political parties. Students focused on the issues that mattered the most to them, namely climate change, immigration, safety, and relations with Indigenous peoples. They also analyzed the plans and promises of each party and evaluated which party's platform aligned the best with their values and beliefs. Finally, each student created a video that explained why they chose to vote for a particular candidate or party.

From October 15 to 18, 1.2 million elementary and secondary school students participated in

Student Vote Canada 2019. In total, 8,097 schools reported 1,199,939 votes, with results from all federal ridings. CIVIX compiled and shared results from schools all over the nation after the general election. In findings that paralleled those of the general election, the Liberal party won the highest number of seats (109 seats; 22.34% of votes), while the Conservative Party won the

popular vote (92 seats; 25.07% of votes). There was also far greater support among students across the nation for the NDP (101 seats; 24.84% of votes) and the Green Party (27 seats; 18.08% of votes) than in the general election.

At École Ness, 113 grade six students cast their ballots for the official candidates running in our

riding. The NDP won by a landslide, taking 63% percent of the votes. The Conservative Party (13%), the Liberal Party (10%), the Green Party (7.5%), the People's Party of Canada (5%), and the


Independent candidate (1.5%) split the rest of the votes.

The discussion did not end on Election Night. In our classrooms, we analyzed charts and diagrams of the results. We looked at provincial trends in

voting and considered why parties might have lost or gained seats in different areas. We wondered about the implications of moving from a majority to a minority government. We noticed the discrepancies between the popular vote and seat distribution, which led to discussions about our electoral system.


Throughout this entire project, we witnessed their passion for politics. The students' enthusiasm was evident during conversations, debates with each other and also with their parents during our student-led conferences. They truly blew us away with their ability to develop informed opinions, their readiness to examine their values critically, and their keen interest in civic issues. Not only did we experience some truly transformative learning, but we also had the chance to witness students becoming invested in the future of our nation. Hopefully, we will see a great wave of informed young voters hitting the polls a few years from now!

An outdoor learning adventure on The Hunt Lake Trail



Outdoor, adventure, and knowledge are three words that describe the objectives of a unique outdoor education program constructed for the students of Jameswood Alternative School (JAS). On September 25, 2019, 14 committed students and four lucky staff arrived at school for 7:00 a.m. to depart on an experience of a lifetime. Our first, of hopefully many, alternative pursuits tested weeks of physical training on a one-day hiking trip to The Hunt Lake Trail in Whiteshell Provincial Park.

The two-hour bus trip was an opportunity for students to make connections with fellow students and staff and to discuss their preparation for the challenging hike! For many of the students involved, this was their first trip outside of city limits. Students experienced the benefits of physical activity, tested their fitness levels, improved their mental resiliency, explored the impact of nature on wellness, and applied the importance of teamwork. Each member of our crew completed a total of 14 kilometres!

The Hunt Lake Trail follows the east shore of West Hawk Lake and is renowned for its rigorous terrain, steep climbs, sharp descents, intriguing caves and spectacular views. There are several incredible scenic lookout points along the trail where many students were able to capture photos to frame

great memories. Along the path and in the granite, we discovered petroforms of turtles, snakes, and geometrical patterns shaped during the last ice age. Students were able to see first-hand the fantastic red granite of the Canadian Shield and the abundance of lakes encased within eastern Manitoba. Before departing home, we made a brief stop at the main beach of West Hawk Lake to discuss meteors and the impact one had on creating the lake.

It was a pleasure to provide students with this real-life learning opportunity. They applied their training toward a fun outdoor adventure and experienced the Whiteshell Provincial Park with its abundance of trails, lakes and wildlife. Discussions have already begun for our next hike, and possibly an overnight excursion.

We look forward to sharing details of our next adventure!

Crestview Students tackle tough issues of sustainability


On Thursday, November 7, 2019, five students from Crestview School had a unique opportunity to attend the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) Youth Forum at the Canadian Mennonite University. The event was put on by a group called Learning for a Sustainable Future (LSF). At the event, students participated in various workshops to learn about topics such as water conservation, monarch butterflies, food waste, the UN 17 Goals of Sustainability. Teachers attend professional development sessions with other teachers to learn how to empower students and teach sustainability at our schools.

Students left the workshops empowered to share what they had learned. As a group, they reflected on the day and put together a plan to better Crestview and our community with a sustainability focus. The students plan to reduce how much water is wasted in areas like school bathrooms, the staff room and water fountains. To help us kickstart our sustainability project in our school, LSF gave Linwood a \$200 Action Project Grant Commitment

As a school, Crestview now has a goal in January to begin a school-wide enquiry into sustainability. Our students plan to have our project up and running over the next couple months to partner with the inquiry and excellent work that Crestview is doing.

We look forward to showing how our water sustainability action plan progresses and what impact we were able to have saving water in our school.

SENIOR YEARS PROGRAMMING

Senior Years schools in St. James-Assiniboia School Division are comprised of grades 9 to 12 with programming available to meet the learning needs of every student. In addition to provincial programming, students will have the opportunity to earn accepted university credits while still in high school. Our high schools, in addition to compulsory courses, offer diversified programming for students interested in pursuing arts education in areas that may include band, choral, dance, drama, musical theatre and visual arts. Students wishing to continue with French Immersion studies may attend Collège Sturgeon Heights Collegiate, while vocational credits are offered at two sites, St. James Collegiate and Collège Sturgeon Heights Collegiate.

MIDDLE YEARS PROGRAMMING

Middle Years schools in St. James-Assiniboia School Division are composed of Grades 6 to 8, and are specifically designed to address educational issues involving young people in the transition period between childhood and full adolescence. Along with the regular academic program, all of our Middle Years schools offer a wide range of options as well as extra-curricular activities.

Non-resident students are welcome. However it is important to note that students living outside the Metro area must register by May 15, 2020 to be considered for registration. Students who live within city limits must register prior to September 30, 2020. Please contact the school, the School Board office at 204-888-7951, or visit www.sjasd.ca for more information.


Congratulations to Emily on earning this outstanding athletic achievement! She is the first SJASD student in the 2019-2020 school year to earn this provincial recognition.

The program is supported by the Indigo Love of Reading Foundation and helps Canadian elementary schools raise funds to purchase additional books and educational resources for students. "This was an amazing opportunity for our school," shared Principal Mr. Miller. "This partnership allowed us to almost double our library budget for the year."

The Linwood School Parent Council assisted in monitoring the booth and provided hands-on assistance during the in-store promotions. A big thank-you to Indigo Bookstore Kenaston Common for making this opportunity possible for the Linwood School community. The main school library will see a surge of new books this year, based on the suggestions and reading preferences of the students.
