Greetings from our Board

In St. James-Assiniboia School Division (SJASD), our commitment to children is at the forefront of everything we do. Our decisions are rooted in student data, learning evidence and feedback from all stakeholders in our Division. We work together in all of our 26 schools to ensure our students have the tools, resources and supports they need to flourish in our ever-changing world. As we reflect on the 2017-18 school year in our annual Report to the Community, we see the major milestones we've achieved, as well as the areas we are still working to improve. As student populations change and the necessary skillsets for 21st century learners evolve, our staff are collaborating across all departments to best meet the needs of all learners. We have also developed new educational partnerships to help our staff feel supported in the important work they do in guiding students to reach their full potential.

In the 2017-18 school year, SJASD implemented guidelines to support gender diverse youth by creating inclusive and equitable schools and learning environments. Our Division partnered with Dr. Reece Malone, Lead Trainer for Diversity Essentials, to conduct professional development sessions with all staff and deepen understanding in the area of gender diverse youth. We are in the process of making changes to the physical infrastructure within our buildings to offer equity to all students, including those in our LGBTTO community. On the topic of inclusion, we are committed to monitoring our Accessibility Plan to ensure our facilities are welcoming for all staff, students, and visitors who enter our buildings.

From Pacific Avenue to Alboro Street, we are delivering rich educational experiences centred on our four strategic outcomes. These outcomes are outlined throughout the report and include a strong focus on improving numeracy and literacy skills. Last year, a total of six numeracy and literacy coaches travelled between schools providing hands-on instruction and guidance, as eight coordinators assisted with programming oversight and delivery. Our seasoned Educational Support Services team continued to provide clinical services in an array of areas to achieve student success both inside and outside of the classroom. We are also home to two full-time School Resource Officers, through a partnership with the Winnipeg Police Service, who rotate between our schools to help address any safety concerns that may arise.

Upon the conclusion of our middle years reorganization in June of 2018, we are excited to offer our first french milieu setting at the middle years level. As we continue to support french immersion programming and monitor projections for the future, we are working closely with our educational partners across Manitoba to stay on top of emerging trends. Our partnerships, paired with involvement from our students and their families, help us maintain our promise to provide "Great Schools for Growing and Learning."

Each year, more than 200 local individuals and organizations help provide rich educational experiences for students in SJASD. We are extremely thankful for our partnerships, many of which are long-standing contributors to the schools in our communities. Each year, we also build new connections to help us stay current in our educational practices, procedures and to offer students new educational experiences. In the 2017-18 school year, our Division teamed up with a number of new alliances to accomplish our goals in the areas of diversity and inclusion, as well as Indigenous Education. Below we highlight a few of those partnerships.

An Allied SJASD

We had the pleasure of partnering with Dr. Reese Malone for training and education on gender diversity and human sexuality in February of 2018. Dr. Malone, who has a Masters in Public Health and a doctorate in Human Sexuality, shared an understanding of diverse individuals of all sexes, genders, sexual orientations, gender expressions, sexual expressions and relationship configurations with our team of educators. Along with Dr. Malone’s training, we were honoured to hear from a Winnipeg high school student, who shared a powerful poem to inspire the need for inclusion.

It Takes A Village...

You may be familiar with the African Proverb, and we agree, it takes a community of caring people to raise a child. As our St. James-Assiniboia communities grow and welcome new Canadians, we chose to embark on a journey to bring The Peaceful Village program to SJASD. The program received incredible support throughout the 2017-2018 school year to officially open it’s doors in September of 2018 at St. James Collegiate and George Waters Middle School. The ‘village’ is a space for people with similar experiences to connect and offers courses in English as an additional language, individual and group tutoring, extra curricular activities, passion projects and much more.

Starting New Traditions in Our Community

Our second annual Graduation Pow Wow commenced on May 31, 2018, at Collège Sturgeon Heights Collegiate to celebrate the success of our Indigenous students. Alongside families, caregivers, educators and friends, self-declared Indigenous graduates were celebrated with a community feast, grand entry procession and special diploma presentation. The event draws visitors from across the province who travel to show their support for our students and honour their academic achievements. Many local partnerships help this event come together, especially our Divisional Indigenous Education team, who plan and facilitate the Pow Wow each year and work diligently year-round to promote Indigenous education within our schools.

Learning From Our Scholar in Residence

We are dedicated to supporting Indigenous student success and increasing the knowledge of our staff to integrate Indigenous perspectives into public education. Our employees and their professional development are critical to the success of our Division to increase the potential of all students. On June 20, 2017, we signed the Winnipeg Indigenous Accord outlining our commitment to respond to the Calls to Action from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. One of the ways we followed up on this shared promise was by engaging in a Scholar in Residence model with Dr. Niigaan Sinclair, Associate Professor from the Department of Native Studies at the University of Manitoba, for the 2017-2018 school year. The residency program helped staff grow their knowledge of Indigenous perspectives and gain confidence infusing their learning into lesson planning and classroom activities. Dr. Sinclair is considered an authority on a variety of Indigenous topics and his counsel was greatly appreciated by our Division. As the process of reconciliation continues to grow across Canada, our students are acting as advocates for and demonstrating awareness of Indigenous history and culture, as well as respecting diverse world views.

We work together in SJASD to create a culture of caring towards each other, our local surroundings and building a sustainable future. Our students and staff labour year-round to take action in our local and global communities to inspire positive change for a better tomorrow. As students learn the importance of giving back to communities near and far, they gain a better understanding of the world around them and begin to see themselves as contributing members of our society. Helping students discover the many links between their learning and the real world also encourages them to pursue their own paths towards being responsible citizens who lead healthy and inspired lives and can support others in doing the same.

Coming Together for a Sustainable Tomorrow

In the 2017-18 school year, a diverse group of representatives came together to launch a Sustainable Development Committee for SJASD. The team is working to plan, monitor and report on sustainable development matters within the Division on annual basis to build a more sustainable future for our students. This includes providing staff and students with the tools they need to be advocates for the environment and help them lead sustainable lives. The committee meets on a monthly basis to address emerging issues and trends, and find solutions to improve practices across the Division. A few topics addressed to date include: active transportation to school, paper waste, purchasing guidelines and expanding partnerships centred on Education for Sustainable Development.

Uniting Forces to Ensure our Promise

We stand by the motto “Great Schools for Growing and Learning,” and form alliances with all stakeholders in our Division to meet this end. In the 2017-18 school year, our senior administration and school board sat down with students from all senior years schools in our Division at our annual Student-Trustee Forum to reflect on their educational experiences. We asked students to speak their minds to seek a positive change. We also hosted our annual Parent-Trustee Forum to meet with families and discuss topics such as class sizes, bussing, experiential learning/ field trips, budget expenditures, communication and more. Lastly, we hosted a youth forum at the Canadian Museum for Human Rights to explore inclusivity and social justice topics with students who represented all schools in our Division. Together, these forums help us to stay connected to student experiences, prioritize student voice within our Division and plan our next steps as a united educational community.


Changing Our Spaces, Growing Our Skills

Makerspaces are one example of how our schools are evolving to meet the needs of our students in connection with data research. Makerspaces are popping up in classrooms and libraries across our Division offering varied opportunities for students to explore and demonstrate their learning using repurposed, recycled and new materials. These spaces help students develop the skills they need to be successful in the 21st century, such as critical thinking, creativity and collaboration. These fluid work areas encourage learners to test their imaginations by designing new models, solutions or even inventions. S.T.E.M. (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) related occupations are in-demand and predicted to climb in the future. Classroom installations such as Makerspaces, especially at the early years level, help build S.T.E.M. skill sets for students to thrive in the future. Student learning is tied to real-world applications to ensure our students have the tools they need to accomplish anything!

Applying Learning to the Real World

In May, nine students competed in the Manitoba Envirothon competition in Churchill, including a team from Westwood /St. James Collegiate and a Collège Sturgeon Heights Collegiate team. Both teams ventured through a trail answering questions about soils, forestry, aquatics and wildlife centred on the theme of climate change in the North. The test involved specialized equipment, specimens and identification guides. The competition also consisted of an oral presentation, where teams presented in front of a panel of environmental experts on a specific climate-related issue. This hands-on research experience tasked students with using their knowledge to address issues happening in the world, specifically, in Manitoba.

PHE Manitoba Recognitions

The annual Physical and Health Educators (PHE) of Manitoba Awards evening saw two staff and an entire school earn accolades for their innovative methods and unwavering commitment to students. The event was held on October 19 at Collège Sturgeon Heights Collegiate where St. James Collegiate Physical Education teacher Ms. Van Aggelen was recognized with the Stu Sieme Award. This award honours a school with an exemplary outdoor education program. Physical education teacher Mr. Vermeylen from École Robert Browning was recognized with the PHE Manitoba Early Years Award. This honour is presented to one physical educator at each school level who demonstrates exceptional leadership and dedication to the promotion of physical education in Manitoba. Lastly, Brooklands School earned the Golden Apple Award, presented to a school with a demonstrated commitment towards programming, resources and support of healthy school initiatives.



Yes I Can! Awards

The 28th annual Yes I Can! Awards took place on February 22 at the Victoria Inn Convention Centre. The event, hosted by the Manitoba Council for Exceptional Children, honours the outstanding achievements of children with exceptionalities, as well as the dedicated students and adults who assist in supporting them. SJASD received two incredible honours at the 2018 reception. Grade 2 student Jaycee R. from Strathmillan School received a “Yes I Can!” Award in the area of outstanding athletic achievement. He requires adaptations for most school activities but participates fully in physical education class and is skilled at cycling with his Freedom Concepts bike. As well, educational assistant Gail B. from Strathmillan School received a Certificate of Recognition for her outstanding work in assisting and supporting children in the school environment. Gail has worked with exceptional children for 28 years and her impact on the lives of the students in our Division is visible every day.

Budget Report Summary

2018-2019 Budget Report

In SJASD, our focus is to continually improve the education of our students, while maintaining the lowest possible cost to our taxpayers. This balance is achieved by concentrating on our budget goals and considering any major factors specific to a select budget year.

For the 2018-19 school year, our Division planned for the following circumstances: the Provincial Government reduced the funding to SJASD by 2% for a second consecutive year, directed school divisions to limit their Special Budget Requirement to 2%, and reduce administration costs to a maximum of 3%. The Board of Trustees approved a budget with no cuts to programs or services at schools, provides new initiatives such as Peaceful Village and Adapted Swim Program, and also maintained a low tax increase for the average home of 1.57% or \$2.07 per month.

On March 1, 2018, we held our annual public budget meeting where the Board of Trustees and members of our Finance Department presented and reviewed the 2018/19 Draft Budget. Our final budget reflected the second lowest taxation rate in Metro Winnipeg. Join us for this year's Budget Meeting on February 28, 7:00 p.m. at the board office to review the 2019-2020 Draft Budget proposal.




