Early Years



Instruction in the following curricula: Language Arts, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Physical Education/Health and the Arts is focused on meeting the unique needs of Early Years students. Instruction focuses on the integration of subject matter and heads-on activity-based approaches to learning.

LAST YEAR'S BROAD AREAS OF FOCUS

What did the evidence of student learning tell us?

Assessment data was examined and responsive instructional programming was undertaken in all areas.

Students continued to improve reading comprehension and written expression. Shared reading and writing experiences were implemented. UFLI and a renewed focus on phonics instruction in teaching reading was adopted in the Primary grades. The reading and writing connection was an ongoing area of emphasis.

Students continued deepening their number sense and applying mathematical thinking and understanding concretely, orally, symbolically and pictorially through CGI (Cognitive Guided Instruction).

What are the anticipated next steps?

In Literacy:

Our teachers will continue to utilize our tailored, specific reading intervention project through assessing and planning for instruction in phonics, decoding and comprehension skills in reading, and in applying learning through writing.

In Numeracy:

This was a very successful year in continuing our CGI journey. Teachers will seek new ideas from our Divisional Numeracy Coaches and from our targeted meeting times and book studies, for continued improvement in the area of numeracy and ultimately number sense for students.

IDENTIFIED AREAS OF FOCUS

Literacy: Students developing reading skills through direct instruction in decoding, phonemic awareness, sight word recognition, oral language and comprehension. Phonics instruction (UFLI) will play a renewed role in the teaching of reading.

Numeracy: Students developing their abilities to represent their mathematical thinking concretely, orally, pictorially, and/or symbolically, through utilizing math talks and routines, counting collections, CGI problems and rich tasks.

Indigenous Education: Authentic learning opportunities with students and staff to learn and value Indigenous cultures, languages, knowledges, and true history. Our focus is on learning about Treaties and the land and people in our community.
