<u>Literacy</u>

Students will demonstrate improvement in their proficiency in reading comprehension. Students will develop their identity as a reader.

Numeracy

Students will represent concepts concretely, pictorially and symbolically and be able to apply their deeper understanding of concepts while completing tasks that require a higher depth of knowledge.

Mental Health & Wellbeing

Students will become mindful of their emotions, feel safe, welcomed and connected at school and feel empowered to make positive changes within themselves and in our chool.

What Did the Evidence of Student Learning Tell Us?

Literacy

Throughout the year, specific reading and thinking strategies were taught and practiced by all students during daily school-wide literacy time. Book displays in the school library and classroom libraries exposed and encouraged students to explore different genres, authors, and formats of books to further develop and refine individual reading identities. Also, during literacy time, students were exposed to many diverse, high-interest texts through book talks, first-chapter samples, and book trailers, while physical copies of books were made available to students wanting to explore a text further.

Numeracy

Students were exposed to multiple representations of concepts throughout the year to support a deeper understanding of the content learned. An

emphasis on using manipulatives was used in classes to support student learning. During numeracy, students were provided opportunities to refine their mental math skills using multiple methods to solve expressions and equations. They were also tasked with low-floor/high-ceiling rich tasks promoting critical thinking and problem-solving skills.

Mental Health & Wellbeing

Students participated in a survey intended to measure if they feel that school is a safe and inclusive place for them. The survey was completed early in the year and data was collected to determine priority areas to focus on. Most of the follow-up data was anecdotal as we focused on specific students who indicated that they do not feel safe or included at school.

Anticipated Next Steps

Literacy

Teachers will continue using high-yield teaching practices with a focus on create authentic learning experiences with opportunities to connect with real audiences to enhance students' sense of purpose and engagement.

Numeracy

Teachers will continue to incorporate multiple representations of mathematical concepts in their teaching to promote a deeper understanding of concepts. These representations will include symbolic, contextual, physical, verbal, and visual to provide a holistic understanding of concepts learned.

2023-2024 Identified Areas of Focus

Literacy

- Students will engage in daily independent reading focusing on choice, purpose, and authenticity
- Students will be exposed to read-alouds, independent reading, and a variety of texts (picture books, images, animated shorts, articles)
- Using a variety of texts, students will be exposed to evidence-based strategies and given opportunities to apply their learning in a variety of formats (literature circles, independent reading, novel studies, etc.)

Numeracy

- Students engage in multiple representations (Visual, Physical, Symbolic, Contextual & Verbal Principles to Action NCTM) using a variety of ways to be flexible to show their learning and apply their understanding to deeper level questions through these experiences.
- Support student understanding of math concepts using many representations. (Be flexible to try other representations to show their thinking.)
- Students engage and persevere in activities, lessons, and assessments that explore all types of representations.
- Students are able to successfully demonstrate their understanding of concepts on Divisional Common Assessments, teacher observations and conversations and school-based tasks, requiring deeper level thinking.

Mental Health & Wellbeing

- Students are engaged and feel a strong sense of belonging when the environment is visually vibrant with colourful decor and active participation, including lively discussions and supportive teacher-student interactions.
- Students have a sense of emotional well-being and belonging. Overall, the ambiance is filled with positive energy, mutual respect, and a strong sense of school culture.
- Bring parents/caregivers into our school community more often than in the past. This will result in there being more positive interactions and students' sense of belonging within the school community.
