## **Bus Cancellations and Indoor Recess**

In the event that the school buses are cancelled due to extreme cold weather (a wind chill of -45 °C or colder), information will be posted on the St. James-Assiniboia School Division website: https://www.sjasd.ca by 6:30 a.m.

As per division policy...

In the event that the temperature and/or wind chill is between -25 °C and -28°C, children will be allowed outdoors for 10 minutes. If the temperature and/or wind chill is below -28 °C, students will be kept indoors for recess.



## **Appropriate Winter Clothing**

Students are required to go outside during cold weather and therefore must dress appropriately.

Hats, neck warmers, mittens, scarves, warm jackets, ski pants and boots are all excellent choices for a cold winter day!

Please make sure that your child is dressed appropriately for the weather before he or she leaves home. We will do our utmost to ensure that students wear their winter clothing when going outside.

### The Citizen Online Police Reporting System

In October 2012, the Winnipeg Police Service launched the Citizen Online Police Reporting System, an online reporting system that allows citizens to electronically report non-violent incidents where there are no suspects. This initiative was part of the Service's Strategic Plan to improve public access to police processes through technological and electronic

enhancements and has proven to a be popular reporting option.

The Citizen Online Police Reporting System eases the amount of time victims of crime spend reporting incidents. The system also provides the Service with better data for crime analysis and deployment of resources and enables better management of call volumes through the Service's Communications Centre.

In 2016, in an effort to continuously improve the service provided to the citizens and businesses of Winnipeg, the Winnipeg Police Service announced a number of ongoing improvements to the Citizen Online Police Reporting System.

In July 2016, the Winnipeg Police Service announced the improvement where citizens and business community partners could report incidents online and take any physical or video evidence to the closest police service centre.

In September 2016, the Winnipeg Police Service expanded the system to allow for the reporting of break and enter to outbuildings, specifically detached garages or sheds. In January 2017, the Winnipeg Police Service announced the latest improvement where

citizens can make reports involving non-urgent traffic or manner of driving complaints. Some examples of these types of complaints may include stop sign or red light infractions, excessive speed, aggressive or careless driving, speeding in school zones or passing a stopped school bus with its lights flashing.

Incidents involving impaired drivers, motor vehicle collisions or events involving immediate concern for public safety cannot be reported online. The Winnipeg Police Service ask citizens to call 911 or non-emergency in these cases.

Citizens can report the following incident types using our Citizen Online Police Reporting System:

> \*Break & Enter into outbuildings, detached garages/sheds \*Damage to Property \*Damage to a Vehicle \*Lost Property \*Theft - including Shoplifting & Gas Drive Offs \*Theft from a Vehicle

> > \*Traffic Complaint

Online reporting does not replace traditional reporting. It is simply an enhancement providing an alternative for citizens and businesses. <u>www.winnipeg.ca/police</u>
