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The Middle Years (Gr. 6-8) provides a stimulating and supportive learning environment where high expectations, collaboration and continual learning are promoted. Early adolescents have unique emotional, social and developmental characteristics. Staffing, curricula and programming in middle schools are focused on meeting these needs. The programs in the Middle Years build on the programming in the Early Years.

Last Year's School Accomplishments (2017-2018)

École Ness' professional staff focused on the area of student assessment with emphasis on mental math estimation.

- ✓ Report card and provincial assessment data were used to inform instruction.
- ✓ Students were exposed to a variety of mental math strategies and were encouraged to solve problems in multiple ways.
- ✓ Students received appropriate programming (intervention, enrichment or remediation) based on their performance from the baseline assessment.
- ✓ Staff and teachers worked with a Numeracy Itinerant Resource teacher to support learning and sharing a variety of mental math strategies.

École Ness' staff and students continued to focus on being good global and local citizens.

- ✓ Staff developed personal relationships with students in order to foster connections.
- ✓ Staff provided all students with an opportunity to engage in social justice activities supporting local and global initiatives. le: student leadership, Social Justice Club.
- ✓ Students were given opportunities to set goals and reflect on citizenship.

École Ness' professional staff continued to focus on deepening the readingwriting connection across the curriculum.

- ✓ Teachers prioritized authentic reading/writing experiences that provided an opportunity for students to read/write with power and agency and therefore, empowered them to advocate for themselves, their communities, and the environment.

A Quick Snapshot of the Classroom

Mathematics: Students worked towards using a variety of mental math strategies to support solving mental math problems. Students explored Mental Math skills in numerous ways like estimation, not only with sums, differences, products and quotients, but also in calculations of circumference and area of circles using the value for pi as simply 3.0. Teachers used report card and provincial assessment data were used to inform instruction.

English and Français: Throughout the year, students had the opportunity to focus on deeper reading in both English and French languages, by using their critical thinking skills while researching and reading about various topics. Through regular and ongoing discussions, debates and practice, students became independent thinkers and problem solvers. Students were asked leading questions to draw information, inferences and predictions about various topics and used those answers to understand the world we live in. Thinking through inquiry continued to help students understand ideas/concepts at a deeper level.

Arts: The visual art program is a comprehensive program that introduces the students to the elements of art in Grade 6 and the principles of art in Grade 7. The Grade 8 students build on this foundation by exploring more complex ideas and mediums. The program provides the students the opportunity to experience a wide variety of art movements and artists, different art media, and tools and techniques.

Science: In Science students focused on creating scientifically literate students. The science learning experience incorporated the essential science and related applications. Scientific knowledge is necessary for understanding the relationships among these related applications. To understand these relationships, it is essential that students understand the real world values related to science, technology, society, and the environment. To achieve an increase in scientific literacy students focused on answering more in-depth questions, solving problems and making decisions.

Social Studies: The Social Studies department focused on building common language to use with students in relation to each of our four Essential Learnings. By doing so, students were able to understand what skills are required for the communication of their understanding, managing their ideas and information, thinking both critically and creatively and being active democratic citizens.

This Year's School Goals and Priorities (2018-2019)

- 1. Reading and Writing in English and French. Students will improve their ability to; read a variety of genres in order to interpret and evaluate information critically considering various points of view, and write in order to communicate their thinking.
- 2. Communication in Mathematics. Students will improve their ability to communicate their problem solving processes, strategies and solutions orally, concretely and in written form.
- 3. Creating a community/culture of French language learners: Students will improve their confidence, fluency and frequency of use in French language and will identify as part of the French community.
