Principal's Message

It is that time of the year when we cherish all the things we are grateful for and give thanks for the many things in life that we appreciate.

As the administrator of Phoenix School, I am grateful for many things. I am starting my 5th year at the school and I treasure all the students in the building. They are all great kids! The teachers, educational assistants and all the staff at the school are truly outstanding. Everyone, students and staff, do their jobs

Phoenix School is also situated in a wonderful rural setting. The picturesque setting and the colourful foliage create a wonderful location for learning.

Unfortunately, the renovations in the building are taking much longer than ever anticipated. I keep reminding myself that the renovations on the portables will extend the life of this part of the building. As well, several items are new, such as: a new mechanical room, some new windows, new siding, fresh paint and a new foundation. These will be wonderful spaces for the school once the renovations are complete.

Bright Beginnings Child Care and the library have been displaced and the re-location of child care to the gym is neither optimum nor convenient. But I am truly grateful to the Bright Beginnings personnel and Mrs. Bremner for their positive approach to a somewhat less than ideal situation. I am very grateful that they are professional and flexible at all times. Thank you.

I am so very pleased with the arrangement between our school library and the Headingley Public Library. Bonnie Brown, Kathy McIssac and Mrs. Biggar have established a very good working relationship and library classes have been able to continue. The students have demonstrated their respect for using another space which does not belong to them. The school is truly blessed to have such gracious and compassionate individuals so that the education of the children does not suffer and we can continue to encourage reading and the love of books. Thank you.

Mr. Villesche, Phoenix's day custodian, is trying to ignore the lack the ceiling tiles, especially the huge gaps in the main hallway. The replacement tiles are in storage behind all the Bright Beginnings Child Care equipment which is being stored temporarily by the school. I know these holes in the ceiling are annoying and unsightly but we are very grateful to have such an efficient and caring custodian for the school. Thank

Unfortunately, there are some changes that need to be implemented due to the lack of space. The Halloween Parade will not happen in the same manner as it has in the past. There will be no last period Halloween Parade in the gym as there is not enough space to accommodate the children and their families. The children will do modified parades with their reading buddies and through private invitations to other classes. I am grateful that the concept of sharing our joy of the celebration will not be lost and will continue to be implemented in a meaningful, more intimate setting.

The October Assembly will also need to be re-scheduled to November 21st. Room 15 and Kindergarten have agreed to co-host this assembly and the teachers have agreed to distribute the monthly awards in a manner that is fair and equitable to all students. I am grateful that this important activity is not lost and can still be implemented in a modified way. Thank you to Mrs. Slyker and Mrs. Turabian and all the teachers for this modification.

The adjustments that are being made whether it is a new format for outdoor recess on the tarmac or Halloween parade and assemblies, I am grateful that decisions are continued to be made in the best interest of the children. The school will continue to provide the students with the best learning environment possible as we navigate our way through longer than anticipated renovations. Thank you, everyone!

Roots of Empathy

Roots of Empathy is an evidence-based classroom program that has shown dramatic effect in reducing the levels of aggression and violence among school children while raising social/emotional competence and increasing empathy. Developed by Mary Gordon in 1996, the program is being provided at a variety of grades throughout the St. James-Assiniboia School Division.

Roots of Empathy's mission is to build caring, peaceful and civil societies through the development of empathy in children and adults. The heart of the program is an infant and parent who visit the classroom once a month for the full school year. The class is involved in two other lessons per month that focus on the baby's development.

This year we have Mrs. Lauder who will work with a specialized curriculum to coach students in observing baby's development, interacting with baby and learning about infant needs and temperament.

Ready, Set, Kindergarten!

Ready, Set, Kindergarten! is an activity-based program being hosted by Phoenix School for children born in 2013 and 2014. The 3 and 4 year-old children explore, with their parent(s), a variety of hands-on activity centers. The centers are designed to build the child's confidence and capabilities to grow their skills as they get ready to take the next steps to Kindergarten.

The sessions are planned from 4:30 to 6:00 p.m. at the school in the gym. The activities are based on a free-flowing concept. The 3 and 4 year-old children will choose the activity they are interested in and the children will decide how long they wish to stay at the center.

The centers stations emphasize the concepts of:

- -Literacy (e.g. rhyming, phonemes, etc.) activities
- -Numeracy (e.g. patterning, sorting, etc.) activities
- -Fine motor activities
- -Gross motor activities
- -Language activities
- -And a healthy snack.

The following dates have been planned:

This is a total of 7 sessions. You will notice that these sessions are held on the last Thursday of each month (except December) from 4:30 to 6:00 p.m. The last session is planned for the end of May.
