Principal's Report

1. Phoenix School Code of Behaviour:

- a. It is a requirement of the Department of Education that each school has its own Code of Behaviour.
 - i. All the elementary schools in St. James-Assiniboia have the exact, identical Code of Behaviour almost copied 100% from the province's model. Essentially, the only thing that has been changed is the name of the school.
 - ii. Everyone is required by the Department of Education to share with the entire community the school's Code of Behaviour in the very first newsletter each fall and to present it at the first parent council meeting.
 - iii. It is on our web-site.
- 2. <u>Terry Fox Run</u> was held on September 28, 2017. The monies go directly to the Canadian Cancer Society Manitoba Division.

3. <u>Halloween – October 31 National UNICEF Day</u>

a. The school has also requested that parents make donations to UNICEF that day. October 31 is National UNICEF Day. In the past, children would collect for UNICEF as they collected their candies and treats. Over time, this became an unsafe practice and was changed to donations or implementing Halloween events / activities as fund raisers.

- b. In the past 4 years, the students and parents have donated \$521.61 to UNICEF.
- c. This year, due to the continued renovations on the portables, the Halloween Parade in the gym during last period will not be happening. Instead, classrooms will parade with their reading

buddies and by invitation. Actually, this has provided the school will another authentic writing opportunity for the students ---- an invitation to a special activity celebrating Halloween.

4. Restitution: This will continue at Phoenix School.

- a. Phoenix School staff members have all been trained in Restitution as of November 1 & 2, 2017. Everyone has their Level 1 certificate and two staff members do have more levels of training.
 - i. Restitution is defined as a creative approach to discipline, which recognizes that children / adults make mistakes and that these situations provide opportunities for students to take responsibility, choose effective behaviors and create positive solutions.
 - ii. In Restitution, it is O.K. to make mistakes. Everyone makes mistakes regardless of your age. We learn from our mistakes and we learn how to atone for our errors and fix the problem so that it does not happen again.
- b. The school will be continuing with its restitution assemblies. There are 5 planned for this coming school year.
 - i. There is a large group of grade 4 and 5 students who perform role plays for the student body on specific, behavioural incidents which have occurred at the school either on the playground, in the classrooms or in the school.
 - ii. The incidents are paired with specific elements of Restitution theory which will be reviewed for the students and modelled for the teaching staff.
 - iii. Ruth Hargrave, the divisional expert on Restitution, usually portrays the duty teacher, the classroom teacher and sometimes, lunch supervisors. The school considers these valuable teaching dramatizations and as teaching sessions, we usually do not invite family members to observe.

5. READY, SET, KINDERGARTEN!

- **a.** Ready, Set, Kindergarten is an activity-based program being hosted by Phoenix School for children born in 2013 and 2014. *This is the third year for this program.*
- **b.** The 3 and 4 year-old children explore, with their parent(s), a variety of hands-on activity centers. The centers are designed to build the child's confidence and capabilities to grow their skills as they get ready to take the next steps to Kindergarten.
- **c.** The sessions are planned from 4:30 to 6:00 p.m. at the school in the gym. The activities are based on a free-flowing concept. The 3 and 4 year-old children will choose the activity they are interested in and the children will decide how long they wish to stay at the center.
- **d.** The centers stations emphasize the concepts of:
 - Literacy (e.g. rhyming, phonemes, etc.) activities
 - ii. Numeracy (e.g. patterning, sorting, etc.) activities
 - **iii.** Fine motor activities
 - iv. Gross motor activities
 - v. Language activities
 - vi. and a healthy snack.
- e. The following dates have been planned:
 - October 26
 - November 30
 - ➤ January 25
 - February 22
 - March 22
 - > April 26
 - ➤ May 24
 - This is a total of 7 sessions.
- The school has partnered with MacDonald Headingley Recreation District to help defray the costs of this program. This partnership is in its third year.

6. READY, SET, Move! A Parent / Tot Activity Session

Ready, Set, Move! A Parent / Tot Activity Session is a physical activity hour *co-sponsored by Sport Manitoba and Phoenix Elementary School*. It is 1 hour from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m. for 8 different sessions and each session will be held in the Phoenix School Gym.

The physical activity program will be for children ages 2 to 6 and their parents.

a. ECE and Kindergarten – My Pet Needs Me

How do we take care of our pets? How does a responsible owner keep their pet safe and healthy?

Motion #2: That Parent Council cover half the costs of the Winnipeg Humane Society Presentations which is \$245.00 divided by 2 = \$122.50.

- 9. **Artists in the Schools Program.** The school has Leanne Kehler coming to the school for 14 days in January, 2018 to work with <u>all</u> of our students on writing. The school has applied for a grant to support this programming and we were awarded \$3,000.00. *As such, there are no other costs that the school is required to pay.*
- 10. *Michael ManyEagles*: The school is continuing its priority of expanding the students' knowledge about Aboriginal culture and philosophies. This coming school year, the school has arranged for

Michael ManyEagles to return to the school for 4 days to implement soap stone carving and to explore indigenous stories and language.

He has been asked to explore the concept of Indigenous Water Stories with the students. This is to support the theme of water which the school has undertaken as its sustainable development goal.

11. Rooms 4, 15 and 16 have partnered with an Indigenous educator, Richelle Scott, to explore the philosophies and perspectives of the Indigenous peoples with water. She will be visiting these classrooms often throughout the course of the school year. She will also have two field trips with the students to the visit the river bank.

Kindergarten will get the Sky Zoo.

Grade 3 /4 -04 will get a second show ---- First Heroes

A special thank you is extended to the Headingley Public Library for allowing Phoenix students and staff to utilize their space and take out library books. Mrs. Biggar and the Phoenix teachers have been most appreciative of this special opportunity and their flexibility is greatly appreciated as well. A special thank you is extended to the school division who continues to pay for the monthly rentals of the storage container for Bright Beginnings Child Care.

This extended renovation period has resulted in a change in the school's Halloween Parade, the postponing of the October Assembly and the postponing of the Scholastic Book Fair. (The Book Fair will now happen during the March Parent / Teacher / Student Conferences on March 15 and 16, 2018.)
