STRONG FOUNDATIONS FOR READING AT STRATHMILLAN

This year, Strathmillan School introduced the **Acadience Reading Screener** for students in Kindergarten through Grade 3. The screener is a research-based tool that helps teachers understand how students are developing essential early reading skills. By identifying areas of strength and need, teachers can provide timely support and ensure every child is on the path to becoming a confident reader.


How is It Different?

In some ways, this approach is not different than what we were already doing. We know early literacy is critical for long-term success, and we have always included word work. However, we are putting more emphasis on whether young children have foundational knowledge. When they know the sounds of letters and how to say letter combinations, they can decode words fluently and accurately. We've already been able to document growth in Strathmillan students' knowledge in our progress monitoring before the holiday break. This information helps teachers plan instruction that is systematic and responsive to each child's needs.

Who's Leading the Way?

Our work is supported by an incredible team:

- Melissa Kirkland and Helen Proulx, our literacy coaches, who have been working closely with teachers to deepen understanding of effective reading instruction.
- Kellie Straub has provided outstanding leadership in organizing and analyzing the assessment and the data.
- Division leaders and coaches have also played a key role in guiding this initiative, including Deidre Sagert, Rosanna Montebruno, and Sandra Melo.



What About Older Readers?

In later grades, teachers are examining instructional practices that are important for confident, meaningful reading. We're developing teaching strategies for rich vocabulary, encouraging fluent reading, enriching background knowledge, and writing about what we read in order to help students tackle complex texts. Teachers in grades 4 – 5 are learning together from the leadership of our program leader, Sherri Steuart, guided by the work of Doug Lemov (*Teach Like a Champion*).

Our teachers are committed to learning more about systematic approaches to reading instruction, while continuing to nurture thoughtful, engaged readers and writers. These efforts are reflected in our school plan and represent an important step toward building strong literacy foundations for every child.

MUSIC NEWS – MS. DAWSON

In early December, students worked hard to learn and perform their winter concert. It was a huge success! Thank you to the families that were able to attend the matinee, evening shows, and live streams. During the show, students sang about wanting a snow day, and before the end of the year, we had a snow day! I wonder if our Strathmillan students wished that into being!

We were also very fortunate to be invited to Golden Gate to listen to the bands play their concert repertoire for us. SAFETY and SECURITY REVIEW

We have been reviewing our safety procedures to protect Strathmillan children since the incident in a Winnipeg School in November with an unwelcome visitor. We are focusing on strengthening our procedures to control access to the building:


- All staff will be wearing ID badges while inside the building, including replacement staff, lunch supervisors, and volunteers.
- All doors will be locked during the school day, except for the front door, which is monitored by direct line of sight and cameras.
- Entry doors will be monitored during recess and lunch reentry.
- All visitors must check in at the office

Please be gracious with our staff upon arrival as these safety procedures take time and diligence. What's most important is that we do everything we can to keep children safe at Strathmillan.

KC's Minions – Helping Students Solve Small Problems

At Strathmillan, our Grade 4/5 Kelso's Choices Recess Helpers proudly call themselves KC's Minions! Their mission is simple but powerful: to support students during recess when they encounter small problems that are not dangerous or scary and can be solved by the students



themselves.

Our message is clear: "You are strong enough and smart enough to solve your own small problems."

KC's Minions wear high-visibility vests and carry a clipboard with all nine Kelso's Choices for quick reference. They also have a helpful script to guide them if they get stuck. If a student has a big problem, the Minions will direct them to a duty teacher for assistance.

This leadership role helps our Grade 4/5 students develop valuable skills while making recess a positive experience for everyone. By encouraging problem-solving and independence, KC's Minions are helping build a stronger, more supportive school community.

Tips to keep on reading throughout the winter season:



Set aside 15 minutes daily for reading. Create a cozy area with good lighting and choose books you can enjoy together. For those children starting to build their reading stamina through novels, consider reading a chapter or two aloud to your child. They will get excited about the story and want to read more! For storybooks, consider “you read to me, I’ll read to you”: you read one page, and your child can read the next page. Whether reading together or independently, focus on enjoyment, not speed.







PHYSICAL EDUCATION – Mr. McKenzie and Ms. Orsulak

Our grade K and 1 students practiced balanced and coordination on an obstacle course that included a balance beam, steppingstones, ramps, and curvy lines. These activities help children develop balance, strength, and coordination that helps them succeed in outdoor play and sport.



Our mini gym was out of commission for the last week of December, as the tile floor is being replaced with new vinyl gym flooring. We're very excited about the improvement!



Among other activities, students in the intermediate grades have been playing games like guard the pin. To play, students have to protect their bowling pin from being knocked down by other players using dodgeballs. Players develop teamwork, communication, and movement skills, plus it's super fun!

Friendship Indoor Soccer Tournament

Grade 4-5 Strathmillan students participated in the Friendship Indoor Soccer Tournament on November 28 at Athlone and Bannatyne schools. The tournament takes all the students who played against one another in inter-school play and combines students on different teams to play along side one another on tournament teams. The idea is to promote friendship between students in different schools. In future, these same students will be playing together as Sturgeon Heights Huskies!

Mr. McKenzie noted that we've never had as many grade 4-5 students participate in the tournament (62), and the attendance at early morning practices and after-school tournaments was commendable! It's a testament to the success of our students that they have the sense of responsibility to fulfill their commitment to team play.
