LAST YEAR'S BROAD AREAS OF FOCUS

The Mamàhtawisiwin school assessment tool completed by staff, highlighted areas for growth, particularly in fostering authentic involvement and understanding of worldviews, values, identities, traditions, and contemporary lifestyles.

Recognizing the importance of land-based learning and engagement of families, Elders, Knowledge Keepers, and community members, we worked to develop a course centered on Indigenous teachings and ways of knowing. The goal was for all Grade 10 students to take the course, deepening their understanding of Indigenous cultures and perspectives. Mental Health and well-being is a priority at CSHC. Research supports the need for youth to receive mental health education in their learning environment. To address this, our Wellness Wednesday sessions, created and implemented by our Student Services team focused on mental health literacy in Grade 9 & 10 English classrooms. Our goal is for all students to be exposed to mental health lessons, fostering a supportive and proactive approach to well-being.

The school's continuous focus is on building connections. Last year a push to create strong connections at CSHC was an essential focus for developing a positive, inclusive, and supportive environment. By fostering relationships among students, staff, families, and the community, we work to ensure students feel seen, heard, and valued, which in turn supports both academic success and personal growth for all our Huskies.

Student Leadership is a central focus at CSHC. We have introduced a leadership class in both semesters, along with gradelevel-based student council representation, to shift the focus toward student-led initiatives. These groups aim to emphasize the importance of student voice and community involvement by organizing and executing events that support a variety of initiatives.

The mental health and well-being of students continues to be a priority at CSHC. We will continue to integrate teachings around mindfulness, connection to the land, and the value of community support. We offer ongoing support for students' emotional and mental well-being.

Academically, Huskies will be encouraged to strive for excellence and focus on preparation for life after high school. At the heart of our school is a strong academic foundation, supported by a rigorous curriculum that challenges students while helping students when needed. We continue to offer Advanced Placement (AP) courses, hands-on learning opportunities, and enrichment activities. Students can expect a wide range of opportunities to explore potential career paths through job shadowing, internships, career fairs, and industry speakers. Our website includes a comprehensive pathway guide under the registration section, helping students plan for their future and understand the connection between academics and career success.
