LAST YEAR'S AREAS OF FOCUS

What did the evidence of student learning tell us?

Literacy: Our goal was to help students become confident readers and writers in English and French. Students practiced word recognition, phonics, and writing through high-quality mentor texts, with guidance from UFLI and Son-au-graphe. Writing samples were used to monitor growth and guide instruction.

Numeracy: Our goal was to strengthen students' number sense and flexibility in math. Daily routines and discussions helped students share reasoning and demonstrate understanding. Teachers used common assessments and PLCs to guide instruction based on student needs.

Community and Well-Being: Our goal was to foster belonging and connection with each other and the land. Students engaged in mixedage outdoor learning to build relationships and explore our reciprocal relationship with the land. Teachers used local and Indigenous resources to create meaningful experiences.

What are the anticipated next steps?

Literacy: Teachers will continue using structured literacy approaches and core literacy assessments to track progress and further support student learning.

Numeracy: Teachers will continue working in PLCs, using the divisional numeracy assessments and progressions to deepen students' number sense and mathematical reasoning across all grades.

Community and Wellbeing: Staff will continue professional learning to integrate land-based curricula and Indigenous perspectives into regular classroom practice, supporting belonging, connection, and well-being for all students.



2025-2026 PLANNING



At École Voyageur, we are committed to providing equitable, engaging, and high-quality learning experiences that support every child's growth. Our goals in literacy, numeracy, and well-being reflect our belief that connection and collaboration among students, staff, families, and community are at the heart of learning. Through intentional teaching and authentic experiences, we strive to help students develop the knowledge, skills, and sense of belonging they need to thrive.

Literacy: Our goal is to improve students' word and sound recognition in English and French to strengthen reading and writing proficiency. Students will build confidence and independence as bilingual readers and writers through explicit, systematic instruction in phonemic awareness, decoding, and vocabulary.

Numeracy: Our goal is to improve students' problem-solving skills. Students will develop confidence, persistence, and flexibility when tackling new or complex problems.

They will increasingly use mathematical vocabulary in oral French to explain their thinking, and independently select and apply a range of strategies and tools to solve mathematical problems.

Community and Well-Being: Our goal is to advance reconciliation by creating authentic learning opportunities with Indigenous Knowledge Keepers, Elders, and the land. Students will grow in understanding and respect for Indigenous cultures, languages, histories, and ways of knowing, applying this learning in their daily actions and relationships.



INDIGENOUS-INCLUSIVE EDUCATION

An Indigenous-inclusive education system is grounded in Indigenous histories, cultures, languages

traditional values, and knowledges. An equitable school community fosters a sense of belonging in all learners so that they feel they can succeed, take responsibility, and find their purpose in life. École Voyageur is committed to embedding Indigenous perspectives across our curriculum and school activities. We will:

- Provide meaningful shared learning experiences that embed Indigenous teachings, such as smudging, beading, and Elder visits.
- Celebrate Indigenous cultures through school events, storytelling, and recognition of Indigenous Peoples' contributions to our shared history.
- Incorporate outdoor learning and landbased education practices that connect students with environment, emphasizing Indigenous knowledge and stewardship.
- Collaborate with the Divisional Indigenous Support Team to create rich and authentic learning opportunities.
